

## Casa do Contador

This main building was built in the nineteenth century as a **residence for a family from São Miguel**. On the next decades, the progressive economic growth across the island gave it several purposes being the last and the most important one a role as a **kindergarten school**. Over the last five decades this school was a well-known reference over all São Miguel. Generations of children still look at the building and remember their childhood. Many of them are adults by now and from time to time they knock on the main door and ask if they can enter to revive their old classroom or just to check the backyard.

Casa do Contador is currently a **short-term accommodation** project started by a couple of young entrepreneurs who have tried to preserve all these divisions and memories to return this heritage to the city.

## About São Miguel History...

Sometime **between 1427 and 1431**, **Portuguese navigators discovered the island of São Miguel**, right after the island of Santa Maria. The initial settlement, dating from 1440 with the arrival of Gonçalo Velho Cabral, was carried out by people who came from the Portuguese regions of North, Estremadura, Algarve and Alentejo. Later, other communities made up of Moors, Jews and foreigners, namely British and French, also settled on the island. The fertile soils and the existence of some safe bays quickly transformed the island into a trading post. The economic growth was sustained mainly by the production and export of wheat and woad which boosted the island's settlement.


Until the devastation left by the earthquake of 1522, **the capital of the island was the town of Vila Franca do Campo**. Then, **Ponta Delgada** started to play the most important role and became the capital in 1546.

The end of the 16th century was marked by the attacks of privateers, and São Miguel was occupied by the Spanish army in 1582 during the Azorean resistance to the military forces of the new King of Portugal, Filipe II of Spain.

After the Restoration of the Portuguese throne in 1640, the commercial development was given a new life by its connection with Brazil. Throughout the **18th century**, the **export of oranges**, mainly to Great Britain, became the main source of wealth. Most churches, decorated with rich woodcarvings, and manor houses, built with refined stonework's that are the delight of visitors, date from this period. From 1870 onwards, the orange groves were attacked by infectious diseases, and given the drastic reduction in production, many locals emigrated to Brazil and to the United States. The introduction of new cultures – **pineapple, tea, tobacco, hemp**– contributed to the economic development of the **19th century** following the turbulent Liberal Wars. The economy of the island kept growing during the 20th century given the expansion of agriculture and cattle breeding, which supplied part of the dairy industry.

However, since the 1980s, the progress of the services sector has been increasingly noticeable, and it now employs most of the local population. Part of this sector, **tourism is the latest investment of São Miguel**, the island where the seat of the Regional Government of the Azores is located.



# DO NOT MISS



## SETE CIDADES LAKE

One of the 7 Natural Wonders of Portugal, it showcases the Green and Blue Lakes, which according to legend, were formed from the tears of a shepherd and a princess who shared a forbidden love. These lakes can be seen from the King's View Lookout, named after King D. Carlos and Queen D. Amélia to celebrate their visit to the island in 1901.



## PONTADA FERRARIA

Spa and bathing site with therapeutic water springs that have been used since the fifteen century.



## FOGO LAKE

A nature reserve since 1974, this crater lake reaches a maximum depth of 30 meters.



## TERRANOSTRA PARK

One of the most beautiful gardens in Europe, it features a thermal swimming pool and more than 2k different trees.



## CALDEIRA VELHA

A waterfall of warm, iron water where you can take a dip, it is located on the north slope of the Fogo Volcano



## RIBEIRA QUENTE VILLAGE

A small fishing village with traditional fishing boats and a sheltered beach.



## V. FRANCADO CAMPO ISLET

A nature reserve located approximately one km away from the coast, it features a salt water inside



## PINEAPPLE PLANTATIONS

The pineapple of São Miguel (Ananas Comosus L.) was originally introduced as an ornamental plant, with its industrial production only starting in the mid nineteenth century. It grows in glass, greenhouses, taking approximately two years to ripen and be ready to harvest.



## FORTE DE SÃO BRÁS

This is the biggest fortress on the island and it protected it against the invasions of pirates and privateers. Presently, it is the headquarters of the Military Command of the Azores and it includes the Military Museum.



## ROMANTIC GARDEN

Dating back to the nineteenth century, they include the António Borges Garden, named after the greatest Azorean landscape architect, and the José do Canto Garden, which has rare collections of plants.



## PORTAS DAS CIDADE

One of the most iconic monuments of Ponta Delgada, the Portas da Cidade (City Gates) were built in the eighteenth century next to the old quay and then transferred to the Gonçalo Velho Cabral Square during construction of the seaside Prince Henry Av. Composed of three arches, featuring in the middle the royal and the city's coat of arms, These gates are the city's postcard.



## TEA PLANTATIONS

São Miguel is the only place in Europe where tea is produced. The first seeds (Camelia sinensis) arrived at the end of the 19th century, along with experts who came to teach the various phases of production. The different varieties of tea depend upon the maturity of the leaves used and upon the manufacturing process.



## SÃO SEBASTIÃO CHURCH

Designed mainly according to the Late Gothic style, the main facade of Manueline style stands out for the royal coat of arms and the shield with the arrows of the martyrdom of St. Sebastian. It was later changed in the eighteenth century. On the south facade, there are two busts identified as King John III and Queen Catherine of Austria.

## SUPER HEROES PARK

A children's playground entirely made of wood, tree trunks and stones. It has circuits, little houses, a bike trail, areas with more or less difficulty, depending on age.

# SUGGESTIONS FOR A RAINY/WINDY DAY

## Ponta Delgada



**Carlos Machado Museum** - - this museum is a great cultural alternative to outdoor activities. Housed in a former convent, it features diverse collections ranging from natural history and religious art to contemporary exhibitions, offering a deep insight into Azorean heritage. Its peaceful atmosphere and well-curated displays make it ideal for a slow, enriching visit — perfect for taking shelter from the rain while exploring the island's history and culture.

**Gruta do Carvão** - visiting the Gruta do Carvão offers a fascinating underground adventure away from the weather. This volcanic lava tube stretches for nearly 1.5 kilometers, featuring impressive rock formations and natural lava sculptures that reveal the island's volcanic origins. Exploring the cool, sheltered tunnels provides a unique experience of São Miguel's geology and nature, making it an exciting and educational escape from the rain.



**Museu Militar dos Açores** – this museum offers an engaging indoor experience for history enthusiasts. Located in Ponta Delgada, this museum showcases a rich collection of military artifacts, including weapons, uniforms, and documents that tell the story of the Azores' strategic role throughout history. With well-organized exhibits and informative displays, the museum provides a fascinating insight into the island's military past and its importance in Atlantic defense.

**Religious Architecture** - São Sebastião church in Ponta Delgada stands out with its beautiful Manueline and Gothic architecture, featuring intricate stonework and elegant arches. Another important site is the Santuário do Santo Cristo, a revered pilgrimage destination known for its striking design and deep cultural significance.



**Pineapple Plantations** - visiting the pineapple plantations is a great way to experience a unique local tradition. Unlike outdoor farms, the pineapples are grown in greenhouses, making it comfortable to visit even on rainy days. A highlight is the plantations in Fajã de Baixo, where you can learn about the entire cultivation process, see the plants up close, and taste the sweet, juicy pineapples that are a symbol of the island. These visits offer an educational and authentic experience of the Azores' agricultural heritage.

# SUGGESTIONS FOR A RAINY/WINDY DAY

## Around the island

**Thermal Waters** - On a rainy day in São Miguel, the island's hot springs become even more inviting. Parque Terra Nostra features a large, iron-rich thermal pool surrounded by lush botanical gardens, Poça da Dona Beija offers a more intimate setting with several warm pools ranging from 25 °C to 39 °C, Caldeira Velha stands out with its natural pools and hot waterfall nestled in a forest setting, and Termas das Caldeiras combine outdoor bathing with spa services. It's highly recommended to purchase tickets online in advance, especially on rainy days.

**Tea Plantations** - A visit to the Gorreana Tea Factory is a great way to experience one of the island's most iconic traditions. Founded in 1883, it is the oldest tea plantation in Europe still in operation, producing black and green tea using traditional methods. The Porto Formoso Tea Factory offers a similar experience, combining history, scenic views, and tea tasting in a charming setting. At both factories, visitors can learn about the full production process — from harvesting to packaging—see original machinery in use, and enjoy fresh cups of locally grown tea.

**Cerâmica Vieira** - visiting Cerâmica Vieira in Lagoa is a great way to discover the island's traditional craftsmanship. This family-run pottery workshop and shop specializes in typical Azorean ceramics, creating pieces that blend functionality and art using techniques passed down through generations. Here, you can learn about the production process, watch artisans at work, and purchase unique items ranging from decorative tiles to traditional tableware.



**The Arquipélago – Contemporary Arts Center** is a great choice for those who appreciate art and architecture. Housed in a former tobacco and alcohol factory, the building blends industrial features with modern design, hosting exhibitions by national and international artists. The space invites contemplation and exploration of new artistic languages, making it perfect for an inspiring visit sheltered from bad weather — a cultural experience that offers a fresh perspective on the island.

**Museu do Tabaco da Maia** – this museum is a great option to explore a lesser-known part of the island's history. Housed in a former factory, the museum preserves the memory of tobacco production, which once played a significant economic role in the Azores. Visitors can learn about the entire process—from growing the plants to manufacturing cigarettes—through original machinery and informative displays.



## DID YOU KNOW?

## INDUCTION COOKING WARE TIPS



1. Check to ensure the cookware is clean and dry
2. Make sure the safety is off by assuring there is no red light turned on near the   
(if it is on, press for 3 to 5 seconds to turn it off)
3. Place the pan on the cookware and turn the cookware on by pressing the ON/OFF button( )
4. On the panel, adjust the temperature by pressing the "+" and "-" buttons corresponding to the zone where you placed the pan
5. If a temperature is not set within 60 seconds, you will have to get back to step 1
